Crashes Worked by WCSO September 2024









Mental Health Co-Responder

Aviation

Aviation performed overwatch for a residential search warrant and two high-risk warrant services. Additionally, they flew searches or pursuits for a suspicious subject allegedly following a female in a park, a juvenile missing at night, an unknown impaired driver, two vehicle pursuits, and a hit-and-run suspect. Aviation also assisted other agencies including Spring Hill PD in a foot pursuit, and the DEA with overwatch on a narcotics investigation. For community interaction, Air1 flew to Grace Christian Academy for a show and tell about the helicopter to the kindergarten classes.

Crime Prevention


WCSO was present in both the schools and community as our students settled into the school year and several popular annual community events occurred. Starting in Allendale Elementary, the DARE program returned to Williamson County Schools. Additional schools have expressed interest in bringing the DARE program to their campuses as well. The yearly visit to Inge-Smith Preschool introduced Deputy Taylor and the Sheriff's Office as the children's friends and protectors. College Grove and Bethesda Libraries both hosted annual Story Time with a Sheriff, where Deputy Taylor read a short story to the children, visited with the children and parents, and fielded any questions.


The City of Franklin hosted their 25th annual 5K on September 2nd and our WCSO booth was set up on the square during the event. The Gathering Church on 840 hosted their second annual Classic Car Show on September 14th showcasing over 20 classic vehicles. WCSO's presence and support of the event both years has been welcome and well praised. After a residential burglary occurred at the end of August, the Old Natchez Community chose to hold a safety meeting at the end of September where Deputy Taylor led the discussion on connected community safety and practical steps to harden their homes. Their community ultimately decided at the end of the meeting to begin developing a neighborhood watch program.

The monthly county convenience center checks were also performed to replace any boxes if needed and to restock personal-sized litter bags. Crime Prevention spent approximately 16 hours in community immersion during September.


